

Rules and Guidelines — 2016 Sarasota Fiction Writers Contest (Prizes: \$100; \$50; \$25; Hon Mention)

- 1. Open to paid SFW members only. (Membership is \$25.00 annually)
- 2. This year's theme is a departure from earlier contests: They will be selecting at least two but no more than five pictures from a group of 20 on the website and then using them as prompts connecting them together into a short story with a solid plot structure.
- 3. Contest deadline: November 15, which is our business meeting in November. Prizes will be awarded at our Christmas party in December.
- 4. The story must be fiction (very creative non-fiction is allowed).
- 5. Must be a short story, not a travel piece, memoir, etc.
 - a. Can be frightening, dramatic, romantic, thrilling, humorous, etc.
 - b. Any genre is acceptable as long as it is not pornographic.
 - c. Have some fun with this!
- 6. Must not exceed 2500 words.
- 7. Must be reasonably well edited.
- 8. Submitting the manuscript:
 - a. If submitting in *paper form*: it must be submitted **no later than our November meeting** (Nov 4). Bring it to the November meeting (Selby Library, 6PM), or mail it to [Patrick Gray, 2935 Bravura Lake Drive, Sarasota, FL, 34240].
 - b. If submitting *electronically*, send it as an attachment (**no later than Nov 15**) to <u>PatrickGray1@msn.com</u>. [*.doc; *.docx, or PDF]
- 9. Formatting:
 - a. As with most contests which will be judged independently, the story needs a cover sheet with the author's name, story title, and contact information. Also at the bottom of cover sheet, tell us which photographs you used as your prompts.
 - b. The author's name should *not* be present on any of the story pages—only on the cover sheet.
 - c. Do not staple (if paper submission) the cover sheet to the rest of the story; simply place it in the same envelope with the story. If submitting via email, put the cover sheet in a separate attachment (you would have two attachments—one for the cover sheet, and one for the story).
 - d. Place the story title (or some recognizable part of it) and page numbers in the top right hand corner of each page of the story itself. (E.g., pages 2, 3, and 4 of Poe's *The Raven* would have *The Raven*/2; *The Raven*/3; *The Raven*/4 in their respective upper right-hand corners.)
 - e. Use one of the common fonts (such as Courier New, Times New Roman, Georgia, or Bookman Old Style).
 - f. Use 12 point, double spaced and with 1-inch margins on all sides.

Saw Palm is a Florida-themed journal, however we welcome writers and artists from across the country and the globe as long as the work is connected to Florida (via images, people, themes, et cetera). We also welcome creative works from Floridians that are not obviously about someplace else. Please check out past issues, available for download as free PDFs. We publish one issue per year in the spring.

Saw Palm does not accept work that was previously published either online or in print. We welcome simultaneous submissions as long as you immediately notify Saw Palm of acceptance elsewhere. Response time varies between 1 to 6 months. Our general reading period is between July 1st and October 1st, however submissions for Places to Stand in Florida are accepted year-round.

All submissions must be made electronically through our online submissions manager. Please upload prose and poetry files in .doc or .docx formats only. Art, photography, and comics should be uploaded in .jpeg / .jpg format only. Paper submissions sent via snail mail will be recycled unread. Click here to submit.

#### Poetry

We accept up to five poems per submission period at a maximum of 10 pages. Please send all poems in one document.

#### Fiction

We ask that fiction submissions be no longer than 6000 words. Please send only one story per reading period.

#### **Flash Fiction**

We accept up to three works of flash fiction (750 words or less) per submission period. Please send all stories in one document.

#### **Creative Nonfiction**

We ask that submissions of memoir and essays be no longer than 6000 words. Please send only one piece per reading period.

#### Art & Photography

We accept up to five submissions of art or photography per reading period. Please send files in .jpeg / .jpg format only. You may also include a URL if a portfolio of your work is online.

#### Comics

We welcome submissions of graphic fiction and nonfiction of up to seven pages, whether in black & white, greyscale, or full color. Submit in .jpeg / .jpg format only. Keep in mind that the journal's dimensions are smaller (5"x7") than the average literary journal and so comics with small panels filled with intricate art are not well-suited.

#### Interviews

We are especially interested in interviews of Florida writers and artists, although we're open to almost any Florida-related subject. Please query us about the interview subject first, via email.

Please tell us what it's like to stand at a specific place in Florida at a specific time of day in 500 words or less. While we enjoy the unusual, locations should be public and accessible (so not your bathroom!) Please include GPS coordinates.

Unlike other categories, current or recent USF students and faculty are welcome to submit pieces for the Places to Stand series.

Poems submitted as part of the Places to Stand series are welcome but should be justified left and otherwise not have complex formatting and spacing. This is due to technical limitations in Google Earth.

#### Update March 2016:

# Words of Wisdom

As I have mentioned, I am putting together a writing website filled with Blogs and Vlogs on every aspect of writing as well as tidbit offshoots of the main subjects. The following is an off shoot of my POV blog. Hope you enjoy it.

Learning to Write in First Person.

In today's writing world of series fiction, characters rule. And the most popular series characters are usually written in First Person. I had only joined Sarasota Fiction Writers for a little over a year, when they announced the theme for the annual contest would be writing in First Person.

OMG! I had never written or even tried to write in first person. Most of what I read at the time was third person, so it was the way I wrote. One of the intriguing elements of the annual contest is getting writers to try something new, to think outside of the box.

So, after moaning and groaning that I just couldn't do it— I tried. I started numerous times and failed. But then I did what I do best. I researched. And I got some tips for writing in first person and suddenly I was off and typing.

So I am about to pass on those tips for those of you who might want to give it a shot.

Become Your Character. Slip into their body, invade their mind, feel what they feel, see what they see, taste what they taste, know what they know. Close your eyes, feel yourself living inside their body. Are you fat? Skinny? Short? Tall? Breathe in. Do you smoke? Have asthma? Are you a runner? How do you feel about the height? Do you tower over others or do you look up and get shoulder cramps? Do you sit differently? What style of walking do you do? Do you stump along, lumbering through a room, do you glide like a jungle cat, or slither through crowds? Do you stroll with confidence or strut your stuff?

Are you younger? Older? Agile? Or Achy?

How do you speak? Do you have an accent? A gravelly voice? A squeaky voice? How is your speech different? Are you speaking like a hippie from the 70's or a teen from this generation? Everything will be different because you're inside someone else's skin.

Imagine how they think, how they feel, what they do.

Now do all these things from inside this other body and tell the story.

First person is a unique viewpoint. It utilizes the "I" and some writers find this repetitive, but unless you get crazy, most readers don't even notice it because they join you within the first person character as long as you are providing the whole experience. First person requires you to know all the things you know from the view of this new character. This is who "we" are.

When your character is scared, your heart pounds, your mouth goes dry, your life is on the line. If you go with a series, the character and the writer really do join souls. We know each other's childhood, where we went to school, what we like to do, who are family and friends are, and we share them continuously. This creates the characters that build fan bases. They are compelling. The reader wants to either BE the character or at the very least wants to be friends and hangout with the character. They are real! Often more real than the friends they go to school with. Because YOU allowed them into the soul fo you and your character.

Since that experiment, I have written in both first person and also continue in third, depending on the genre, the plot, and the characters. I love writing in first person because I can actually BE someone else. I become them and they become me.

If you haven't yet tried it, consider using it for the contest this year. First Person can change the way you see the world.

By the way, I did win second place with my first attempt at first person.

### Sarasota Fiction Writers 2016 Annual Short Story Contest

#### Rules and Guidelines — 2016 Sarasota Fiction Writers Contest (Prizes: \$100; \$50; \$25; Hon Mention)

- 10. Open to paid SFW members only.
- 11. This year's theme is a departure from earlier contests: attached is a set of twenty photographs. You must:
  - a. Select at least two, but no more than five, of the photographs.
  - b. Use your imagination and link them in some way. Have some fun doing it! For example, you could look at the dates—usually just the approximate year, or the location, or whether the setting is urban or rural, or historical, or whether they show animals of some kind, or children, or even war. There are many potential combinations within the twenty photographs. Again, use your imagination. Let it soar!
  - c. Then use your selected/ linked photographs as prompts.
- 12. Contest deadline: November 15, which is our business meeting in November. Prizes will be awarded at our Christmas party in December.
- 13. The story must be fiction (very creative non-fiction is allowed).
- 14. Must be a short story, not a travel piece, memoir, etc.
  - a. Can be frightening, dramatic, romantic, thrilling, humorous, etc.
  - b. Any genre is acceptable as long as it is not pornographic.
  - c. Have some fun with this!
- 15. Must not exceed 2500 words.
- 16. Must be reasonably well edited. We are not going to be so picky as to disqualify over a single comma, but we are a writers group and we should hold ourselves to high standards.
- 17. Submitting the manuscript:
  - a. If submitting in *paper form*: it must be submitted **no later than our November meeting (Nov 4)**. Bring it to the November meeting (Selby Library, 6PM), or mail it to [Patrick Gray, 2935 Bravura Lake Drive, Sarasota, FL, 34240].
  - b. If submitting *electronically*, send it as an attachment (**no later than Nov 15**) to <u>PatrickGray1@msn.com</u>. [\*.doc; \*.docx, or PDF]
- 18. Formatting:
  - a. As with most contests which will be judged independently, the story needs a cover sheet with the author's name, story title, and contact information. Also at the bottom of cover sheet, tell us which photographs you used as your prompts.

- b. The author's name should *not* be present on any of the story pages—only on the cover sheet.
- c. Do not staple (if paper submission) the cover sheet to the rest of the story; simply place it in the same envelope with the story. If submitting via email, put the cover sheet in a separate attachment (you would have two attachments—one for the cover sheet, and one for the story).
- d. Place the story title (or some recognizable part of it) and page numbers in the top right hand corner of each page of the story itself. (E.g., pages 2, 3, and 4 of Poe's *The Raven* would have *The Raven*/2; *The Raven*/3; *The Raven*/4 in their respective upper right-hand corners.)
- e. Use one of the common fonts (such as Courier New, Times New Roman, Georgia, or Bookman Old Style).
- f. Use 12 point, double spaced and with 1-inch margins on all sides.
- *g.* NOTE: Many writers have their own preferred styles of formatting, but we all must follow somebody's contest/publisher guidelines. Within our contest guidelines, you do have some freedom with the formatting, but what you submit should be done as professionally as possible. *Make it easy on the judge's eyes!*






